Purpose

- Prepares for impending Practice Rights
- Assists with those that don't meet **PAg** requirements
- Aligns with partner organizations and other provincial agrology institutes
- Fills gaps in ASTTBC areas of practice



Rationale

- PGA: "Serve and protect the public interest.."
- Provides another avenue for those practicing agrology to become registered professionals
- Clear gaps with agrology-related jobs that do not fit the scope of practice of other provincial regulators
 - ASTTBC does not have an agrology or agriculture scope of practice.



Benefits to the Member

• Benefits for a Person to Register as a **TAg**:

- registration in a professional regulatory organization
- professional development opportunities
- recognition of academic training
- employment opportunities and higher wages
- insurance benefits
- eligible to transfer to other provinces
- ready for practice rights



Scope of Practice

- declared at time of application
- reviewed by Registrar, Deputy Registrar and/or Credentials Committee to ensure in line with education, training, and experience
- limited to two areas of practice (PAg is 3).
- change in the scope of practice must provide affirmation of competence to BCIA via formal request and must be approved
- recognized that most diploma programs are limited to two years and do not fully explore relationships between disciplines as a bachelor's degree would



Restricted Practice

- TAgs may practice independently with a restricted scope of practice
- Allows for:
 - collection of data, to operate equipment, make recommendations to other professionals
- Does <u>not</u> allow for:
 - sign off on documents that specifically require a PAg authorization
- Prevents:
 - advising, interpreting, or recommending in situations where they may present a risk to the public
- Mirrors Alberta Institute of Agrologists (AIA) and College of Applied Biology (CAB) of BC



Entrance Requirements

- Entrance Option 1: Approved Diploma Program
 - BCIA has prepared a list of approved programs
 - Criteria includes 60 total credits, 60% must be agrology related
- Entrance Option 2: Non-Approved Diploma Program
 - Graduation from a college diploma program not on approved list, will be reviewed in full by Registrar/Deputy Registrar and the Credentials Committee
 - Applies where programs are not as prescriptive and elective categories are not consistent across applicants
- Entrance Option 3: Applicants with Degrees
 - Degree does not meet requirements of a PAg
 - Applicant will be subject to practice limitations of a **TAg**



Articling Program

New Registrants must complete the Articling Program prior to achieving **TAg** of which includes:

- Articling Technical Agrologist (**ATAg**) designation
- a two year articling term
- completing various program elements and milestones
- being employed in the practice of agrology for two years
- mentored by a TAg or PAg
 - TAgs may only mentor ATAgs, not AAgs
- may be eligible for term reduction; assessed only at time of application



Upgrade to PAg status

- some diploma programs are eligible for laddering degree programs therefore;
- any **TAg** is eligible to upgrade their education to meet requirements for PAg designation
- some foundational courses in a diploma program (and eligible for technologist) may not meet foundational course requirements for a degree (i.e. Math and Statistics)



Rights of Registration

• TAgs and ATAgs have the same rights of registration as PAg and AAg, respectively

 such as voting rights, ability to serve on Council, committees, or working groups



Registration and Application Fees

- Council approved that fees mirror PAg and AAg fees to reflect the standard of work expected by, and protection of the public, placed on work of the TAg or ATAg
