President's Report - Marc Schuffert, P. Ag.

I would like to begin by acknowledging that the land on which we gather is the traditional unceded territory of the Lheidli T'enneh.

On behalf of the CCI branch executive, I welcome you all to the AGM. Geographically, CCI branch encompass area from Williams Lake to Smithers. The branch is focussed on creating PD opportunities for the members in their respective cities.

As you all know, the BC government introduced the *Professional Governance Act* in November 2018 which has been implemented gradually and will result in significant changes for BCIA and its members.

Another development, on February 28, 2019, the Agricultural Waste Regulation was replaced by the Agricultural Environmental Management Code of Practice to protect our soil, water and air while conducting small hobby farms or large agricultural operations. Some of the key changes include risk-based and science-based approaches to nutrient management. It will be beneficial for all the agrologists to have a read of the Code.

Thankfully, there were no major wildfires in our region this year. However, we had a flooding situation in the region which caused some concerns in the low-lying farming communities. Some roads and portions of farms were damaged during the flood.

There has been tremendous enthusiasm about professional development. The CCI branch held PD sessions on different topics including Groundwater Protection Regulation; how colony size limits provision rates and reproductive success for an arctic seabird; and caribou feeding station near Mackenzie; Sturgeon Hatchery and Farm to Fork tours of local producers.
